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Alexandra Bitusikova received her Ph.D. from Comenius University in Bratislava, Slovakia (1998). She is full professor in ethnology/ social anthropology at Matej Bel University in Banská Bystrica, Slovakia. She was visiting scholar at Cambridge University, University College London and Boston University (Fulbright). From 2001 to 2008, she worked in the European Commission and the European University Association in Brussels. Back in academia, she participated in a number of EU projects and is author of more than hundred publications on urban change, social movements, diversity, identity, heritage and gender in the region of Central Europe (with a focus on Slovakia), published with Routledge, Berghahn Books, Ashgate, Edward Elgar Publishing and Palgrave Macmillan. She considers herself also an engaged anthropologist, being active (as a member and a researcher) in new urban grassroots movements in Slovakia.

Niccolo Caldararo, Ph.D., is a lecturer in the Anthropology Department of San Francisco State University. His research spans economic anthropology, religion and psychological anthropology. He has done more than 20 ethnographic studies for public and private institutions and firms and has published widely on the evolution of hominids, economic anthropology and the anthropology of religion. Introduced by Carlo Cipolla to the evolution of financial institutions while a student at UC Berkeley in the 1960s, he pursued comparative economic studies of traditional people in Central America, Polynesia and Melanesia. Hired as a laboratory assistant by J. Desmond Clark in 1967, he began a career studying and preparing fossils and artifacts for study and the biological adaptations of primates and human variability. He recently published *An Ethnography of the Goodman Building* (2019).

Subhadra Channa is a retired Professor of anthropology at the University of Delhi, Senior Vice-President of the IUAES and Chair of the Commission on Marginalization and Global Apartheid. She held a Charles Wallace Fellowship, U.K. and was Fulbright Lecturer (U.S.A., 2003 and 2008-2009). She has held Visiting Professorhis at the MSH (Paris, 2002), Salvador (Brazil, 2019), Kyoto University and the University of Kentucky. Channa was awarded the S. C. Roy Gold Medal (Asiatic Society) and the Distinguished Teacher Award (Delhi University, 2016). She has authored a large body of scholarly articles. Her books include *Gender in South Asia* (2013), *The Inner and Outer Selves: Cosmology, Gender, and Ecology in the Himalayas* (2013), *Gender, Livelihood and Environment* (ed. with Marilyn Porter, 2015) and *Life as a Dalit* (ed. with Joan P. Mencher, 2019). Professor Channa serves on the Board of *Urbanities*.

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Monica de Cesare is Head of two Operational Units at the University of Messina, dealing respectively with Higher Education and Teacher Training. After graduating in Political Sciences with an experimental dissertation in Sociology of Knowledge, she started working at the Mediterranea University of Reggio Calabria. There, she also administered national and international projects. She has published with Rubettino (2002, 2003) and Mediterranea University Press (2004). In 2013, she moved to the University of Messina, where in 2016 she was appointed Deputy Head of the Erasmus Mobility Unit.
